## 12. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year(maximum five bullets)

Majority of classes were conducted using ICT facility. At the end of academic year, student feedback regarding overall performance of teachers and college was collected and feedback analysis was conducted. Internal exams were conducted to assess student performance and this was discussed in PTA meetings. Students of Biotechnology, Computer Science, Statistics, Chemistry and Biochemistry secured University ranks. PG entrance coaching classes were conducted by few departments and 88 students from different departments sought admission to various Post graduate courses. M.Sc course in Maths was sanctioned.

National seminar was organised by Department of Biochemistry, Biotechnology and Chemistry. Department of Computer Science conducted two days workshop. Invited talk on Artificial Intelligence by Alumni was organised by Department of Physics.

One Faculty of Geography, three from Computer Science and one from Statistics department are pursuing Ph.D. One faculty from department of Geography was awarded Ph.D degree. Faculties of the college published 12 manuscripts/chapters in total in peer reviewed Journal/books. Five presentations in International seminar and ten presentations in National seminars were made by faculties of the college. Two faculties were resource persons in International conference, four in National Seminar and four in State level seminar.

Department of Physical Education organised Intercollegiate KhoKho men championship, Cricket championship and Roll ball Championship. Faculty of Phy. Ed. department served as selector of University Aquatic Water Polo team and Cricket team, Technical official of Intercollegiate Athletic meet and Coconvenor of South zone Intercollegiate Cricket match. In association with IQAC, NCC carried out coastal cleaning (Shanghumukham beach), Bus stand cleaning (Kaniyapuram bus stand) and Celebrated Childrens day in Govt. L P School Chenkottukonam. In alliance with IQAC, NSS organised 'Yuvatha Nadiyodoppam' program, which included cleaning of river banks, planting of bamboo sapling in the river banks and awareness class regarding importance of rivers along the Vamanapuram river at Thellikachal, Pullampara, near Venjaramoodu. Along with Student Union NSS participated in flood relief activities. Participated in 'Samridhi' and initiated cultivation of barren lands near Gandhipuram. Conducted Literacy Survey in the Kariavattom, Palayam and Nettayam regions of Thiruvananthapuram. Conducted blood donation camp along with Blood Bank of Government Medical College, Thiruvananthapuram. Volunteered service during 'Attukal Pongala' and 17th Lok Sabha election maintaining green protocol. Collected money to contribute to Okhi relief fund. Participated in 'NAVYAM', postflood cleaning program. Department of Geography organised 'Geographica', One day workshop for higher secondary students. Organised French Food festival as a part of French National Day.

In association with IQAC, Physical Education department organised coaching camps for football, cricket, volley ball, khokho, chess, athletics, power lifting, rollball and aerobic exercise. Interdepartment competitions in foot ball, volley ball, badminton, Cricket and Athletics was conducted. Students of the college participated in National level competitions in Cycling, Roll ball, Chess, Gymnastics, Boxing, Body building and Kho kho and, south zone Inter University Chess Championship.

# 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Institutional mechanism for curriculum planning and implementation Govt. College Kariavattom , imparts value based quality education of highest order to the students residing in semi-urban areas through an effective implementation of curriculum. The college functions with highly specialized teaching faculties to empower the students to put their knowledge to application and inculcate in them the urge for creative learning and augment fervour for research. The courses offered by the college are career related. Each course imparts appropriate knowledge and skills, aims at refining students' competence to deal with professional works and enables them to make productive performance. Apart from regular lectures, interactive lectures, computer assisted lectures, multimedia power point presentations, student-centred interactive learning through seminars, debates, quiz, group presentations, collaborative learning,

educational tours, industrial visits and visualized technologies are adopted to motivate and stimulate the students' curiosity and to facilitate the comprehension of complicated concepts. Seminars and workshops are conducted to develop the potential of the faculties as well as the students. Continuous assessment of students and feedback and rating of the faculty from students' part are carried out at the end of each semester. The college strictly adheres to the guidelines of the State Government and University of Kerala for the effective implementation of the curriculum. Special classes, if needed, are engaged during vacation and at off hours to compensate for the time lost in regular college hours in-order to provide the teaching hours stated in the academic calendar. Meetings with faculties are convened at regular intervals to discuss the strategies to be adopted for the effective functioning of the college. College pays special attention to the non-scholastic activities like Sports and Games, NCC, NSS and other extension activities to enhance the physical and mental development of the students. NSS and NCC programmes inculcate social awareness and human values in students through plantation, blood donation and medical camps and propagate the need for sanitation and cleanliness in day to day life. The cells / committee are usually provided with complete autonomy in their respective field. They enable the students to bring out their talents and creativity and empower them by imparting guidance, motivation and awareness classes Programmes like WWS, ASAP assist students to identify appropriate area for their higher studies and a set of additional skill to students along with their regular courses .SSP which functions in the college helps the students to overcome their academic weakness. Special attention is given to redress the grievances of the students through these activities. The General Library which is well equipped with quality books, journals magazines and newspapers functions as the knowledge hub of the college. The IQAC maintains a set of standard in teaching, learning and evaluation process. It keeps strict vigil in the academic process and maintains quality and sustenance through self-appraisal. On the whole, the Head of the institution, teaching and non-teaching staff played a pivotal role in the proper functioning and implementation of various aspects pertaining to the

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback was collected from students emphasising thirteen criteria. The subject knowledge of nearly 90 of teachers is rated excellent by students. The communication skills, is also excellent for more than 95 of teachers. On an average, 90 of teachers help students to develop an interest in the subject. The presentation style, of more than 95 of teachers are also rated high by students. Teachers help students a lot to clarify the doubts in the subject. According to students, comparatively less percentage of teachers only succeeds in maintaining discipline in the class. But more than 90 of teachers prospers in keeping a good relationship with students. The teachers are regular and they complete the portions well in advance and to evaluate students based on class tests and assignments. Usage of teaching learning aids by teachers is another factor that needs improvement according to the feedback of students. However, more than 99 teachers step down to students' level to make concepts understandable. Yet, students feel that only 80 percentage of teachers motivate students for extra-curricular activities More than 80 of teachers establish a good relationship with parents. Feedback was collected from Teachers with respect to five criteria. On an average nearly 99 of teachers have rated the curriculum to be outstanding and the rest 1 very good. When 95 of teachers found the academic environment to be excellent, 3 suggested improvement. Only 85 of teachers felt library infrastructure (both in terms of the availability of books and management) to be outstanding, nearly 5-10 felt the need for further improvement. The office administration was excellent to nearly 99 and none was dissatisfied by its functioning. Though most of the teachers were satisfied with traditional teaching, only 75 was satisfied with ICT facility in college. Frequent interactions, most probably, once in a month or when required, will be conducted by Director of DCE(Employer) and college Principal, where discussions and clarifications on the academic and administrative matters are moulded. Feedback was collected from Alumni based on the course they completed, their present designation and accessibility to the college and was excellent for more than 90 and they also felt the college to be accessible. Teachers often communicate with parents and discuss the progress and attendance of students. Moreover, regular PTA meetings help to develop a good rapport between the students, parents and teachers. General body meetings are also conducted and PTA is formed with parent representatives. The feedback collected from all stakeholders is of crucial importance for the development of the institution and is the basis upon which changes for betterment are anticipated for the next academic year. The suggestions given by the students, teachers, alumni on the curriculum were analysed and based on its merit, submitted to the University through the Board of Studies, Academic Council and Senate members of the institution.

Under the SSP scheme, students who require additional support in learning are identified and given special care in the concerned subject by the selected SSP faculties, who are the faculties of college itself. Recognizing the value of skill based education to enhancing the confidence of students, special trainings for SSP students are given in IT skills, life skills, learning skills etc. Special training camps are conducted every often for the internal mentors of the colleges which will help them to motivate the students in a better way. Walk with Scholar (WWS) programme has been designed to arrange specialized mentoring programmes for undergraduate students to provide guidance for their splendid career. Apart from face to face interaction of teachers with students in the regular classrooms, special care and direction is given to selected meritorious students and introduction of various employment opportunities or employment based higher education opportunities is imparted to them by the internal mentors of the programme. Various dignitaries on their expertise domains interact with the talented students. Other highlights of this programme are motivational camp for students, conducting mock interviews and debates for competitive examinations etc. Additional skill acquisition programme (ASAP) is also conducted in a good way in our college. Specially designed ASAP curriculum imparts confidence in the student by improving the communication and information technology skills of the student. Training in skills of selected areas of the industry and service sectors are provided for the student, for example, test engineering, food and beverages etc. Module related to the skill sectors are chosen by the student.

2.5.2 – Reforms init	2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)										
Continuous Internal Evaluation Students are evaluated by continuous and end semester assessments. A college level monitoring committee is functioning to supervise all evaluation processes in the credit and semester system. Class tests are conducted at the end of each module and finally at the end of semester especially focussing on the entry level learners in the institution a model exam in the same pattern as of university exam is conducted to make them acquainted with original evaluation process at the end semesters. Surprise tests and quizzes are also periodically conducted by the department to ensure the regular involvement of students in classes. All the processes are done with the consultation of CLMC. Attendance of the students are also monitored regularly and updated to CLMC by respective departments. Besides the mentors under the mentor- mentee system monitors the performance of their student regularly and support when situation demands. Also the tutorial records are maintained by respective departments to check the growth of the learner.

labs and classrooms are as per rules and regulations stipulated by the Govt. of Kerala. Priority has been given for the proper maintenance of the infrastructural facilities. Allocation of funds for the maintenance of the infrastructure of the college is earmarked in the plan fund of the college by the directorate of collegiate education department. The state Public Works Department is assigned the technical supervision of the works. The laboratories are well equipped with a sufficient stock of equipment and other consumables as per the requirement utilizing the plan fund released by the Department of Collegiate Education. Separate laboratories are provided for the available UG and PG programmes. Repair and renovation works have been done annually to ensure the safety in laboratories as and when the grants are allotted which also include funds from PTA. The college has a well-stocked General library which is partially automated with a good repository of textbooks and reference books such that the students can access them as reference materials related to the syllabi and curricula along with periodicals, newspapers, and other academic publications. Books are purchased annually as per the requirement and suggestions received from the faculty as well as students utilizing the plan fund allotted by the collegiate education department. College has two

playgrounds of which one is a multipurpose court which includes space for football and cricket and the other is a shuttle badminton court. Students are given training for cricket, football, volleyball, kabaddi, kho-kho, archery, fencing, shuttle badminton, athletics, powerlifting, weightlifting and roll ball. Recurring grants are ensured for the purchase of new sports goods and for the maintenance of existing facilities. The college has computer lab facilities which are utilized by the students as part of their curriculum. Regular service and maintenance of the computers are done with the use of plan funds and by the support of PTA funds. UPS and other supporting facilities required for the functioning of computers are ensured with the help of supporting funds. Separate classrooms are allotted for each batch of students and rooms are

allotted as per the student strength. Sufficient furniture and other requirements of classrooms are ensured annually through plan funds provided by the department of collegiate education. Repairing and painting works are timely done with the support of the Public Works Department of Govt. of Kerala. Apart from the students at the college who use the facilities, students of courses conducted by the Continuing Education Cell (CEC) also utilize the facilities of the college such as computer labs and classrooms. Classrooms are also allotted for exams conducted by Kerala Public Service, School of Distance Education, and University of Kerala as and when requested.

The College has constantly shown profound interest in social welfare and Environment friendly activities. We have a very enthusiastically functioning crew comprising of Institutional Social Responsibility Forum (ISRF), Nature Club, NSS and NCC working meticulously as a team in various programmes in these directions. We conducted/organised various activities in this year. Environmentally friendly activities With the intension to uphold the environmentally friendly activities we celebrated World Environment Day on June 5th 2018. The students of our college along with several Faculty members cleaned the College campus and planted several tree saplings. They also participated in cleaning Shanghumukham Coastal area and Kaniyapuram bus stand. As a part of Gandhi Jayanthi celebration, we carried out cleaning programme organized at Central Railway Station, Thiruvananthapuram. Our students did preparatory works for cultivation in certain areas in Gandhipuram near Sreekaryam. Among the various activities, the NSS special camp gave thrust to environment related activities like socio-economic survey on nearby water bodies, beautification of premises setting up of a Garden in the Medical College Health Centre, Pangappara. As a part of the programme, Yuvatha Nadinodoppam initiated by NSS cell University of Kerala, fifty-one volunteers conducted several activities related to river conservation such as 'puzhanadatham', cleaning of river banks, planting of bamboo sapling in the river banks etc. along the Vamanapuram river near Venjaramoodu. The City Corporation's 'Green Army' leads the green protocol campaign activities for

Attukal Pongala and students from this College actively worked hand in hand with the Green Army. NCC unit of the College organised a 'Walk with the River' programme. The Cadets participated in cleaning and beautification of river banks of Bonacaud hill station. An organic farm, a drip irrigation system, butterfly park and mushroom cultivation were implemented in our college. Social welfare activities 'Ockhi' cyclone had hit many parts of India as well as coastal areas of Kerala in November 2017 severely affecting lives of many. We are collected an amount of Rs.1,30,000/- from teachers, students and the public. The sum was handed over to three students belonging to the affected area for their educational purpose. The state witnessed an unprecedented flood that began in the last week of July and lasted till the third week of August which devastated several lives and resources. Immediately after the disaster, the Rapid Relief Team (part of Institutional Social Responsibility Forum) of the College and NSS together initiated relief activities. Money and necessary items were collected from entire College community and sent to the affected area. Our students served as collection agents in the different collection centres and also served in the Sankumukham Helipad for carrying collected materials to different areas as per requirement. Our students also participated a massive post disaster activity in highly flood affected areas of Chengannur organized by NSS Cell, University of Kerala. The NSS Unit in our college organized a Blood Donation Camp to make the students aware of the necessity of blood donation to save the lives of needy.
