1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Govt. College Kariavattom , imparts value based quality education of highest order to the students residing in semi-urban areas through an effective implementation of curriculum. The college functions with highly specialized teaching faculties to empower the students to put their knowledge to application and inculcate in them the urge for creative learning and augment fervour for research. The courses offered by the college are career related. Each course imparts appropriate knowledge and skills, aims at refining students' competence to deal with professional works and enables them to make productive performance. Apart from regular lectures, interactive lectures, computer assisted lectures, multimedia power point presentations, student-centred interactive learning through seminars, debates, quiz, group presentations, collaborative learning, educational tours, industrial visits and

curiosity and to facilitate the comprehension of complicated concepts. Seminars and workshops are conducted to develop the potential of the faculties as well as the students. Continuous assessment of students and feedback and rating of the faculty from students' part are carried out at the end of each semester. The college strictly adheres to the guidelines of the State Government and University of Kerala for the effective implementation of the curriculum. Special classes, if needed, are engaged during vacation and at off hours to compensate for the time lost in regular college hours in-order to provide the teaching hours stated in the academic calendar. Meetings with faculties are convened at regular intervals to discuss the strategies to be adopted for the effective functioning of the college. College pays special attention to the nonscholastic activities like Sports and Games, NCC, NSS and other extension activities to enhance the physical and mental development of the students. NSS and NCC programmes inculcate social awareness and human values in students through plantation, blood donation and medical camps and propagate the need for sanitation and cleanliness in day to day life. The cells / committee are usually provided with complete autonomy in their respective field. They enable the students to bring out their talents and creativity and empower them by imparting guidance, motivation and awareness classes Programmes like WWS, ASAP assist students to identify appropriate area for their higher studies and a set of additional skill to students along with their regular courses .SSP which functions in the college helps the students to overcome their academic weakness. Special attention is given to redress the grievances of the students through these activities. The General Library which is well equipped with quality books, journals magazines and newspapers functions as the knowledge hub of the college. The IQAC maintains a set of standard in teaching, learning and evaluation process. It keeps strict vigil in the academic process and maintains quality and sustenance through self-appraisal. On the whole, the Head of the institution, teaching and non-teaching staff played a pivotal role in the proper functioning and implementation of various aspects pertaining to the curriculum.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

Feedback was collected from students emphasising thirteen criteria. The subject knowledge of nearly 89 of teachers is rated excellent by students. The communication skills, is also excellent for more than 90 of teachers. On an average, 90 percentage of teachers help students to develop an interest in the subject. The presentation style of more than 94 of teachers are also rated high by students. Students also feel that teachers are quite interactive which has helped students a lot to clarify their doubts. According to students, comparatively less percentage of teachers only succeeds in maintaining discipline in the class, which needs to be improved in the coming years. But more than ninety percent of teachers prospers in keeping a good relationship with students. Teachers complete the portions well in advance and evaluate students based on class tests and assignments. Usage of teaching learning aids by teachers is another factor that needs improvement according to the feedback of students. However, more than 99 of teachers step down to students' level to make concepts understandable. Only 80 percentage of teachers motivate students for extra curricular activities, which also needs to be improved in due course. Nearly 81 of teachers establish a good relationship with parents. Feedback was collected from Teachers with respect to five criteria. On an average nearly 95 of teachers have rated the curriculum to be outstanding and the rest 5 very

good. When 90 of teachers found the academic environment to be excellent, 1 suggested improvement, which needs to be given priority in subsequent years. Only 80 of teachers felt library infrastructure (both in terms of the availability of books and management) to be outstanding, nearly 5-10 felt the need for further improvement of the facilities in libraries. The office administration was excellent to nearly 98 and none was dissatisfied by its functioning. Most of the teachers were satisfied with conventional teaching, but 60 was satisfied with the facility for ICT enabled classes. Frequent interactions, most probably, once in a month or when required, will be conducted by Director of DCE(employer) and college Principal, where discussions and clarifications on the academic and administrative matters are moulded. Feedback was collected from Alumni based on their course, their present designation and accessibility to college which was rated excellent by more than 90. Teachers often communicate with parents the progress and attendance of students. Moreover, regular PTA meetings are conducted which helps to develop a good rapport between the students, parents and teachers. General body meetings are also conducted and PTA is formed. The feedback collected from all stakeholders is of crucial importance for the development of the institution and is the basis upon which changes for betterment are anticipated for the next academic year. The suggestions given by the students, teachers, alumni on the curriculum were analysed and based on its merit, submitted to the University through the Board of Studies, Academic Council and Senate members of the institution.

Each department in the college has established tutoring system to cater the individual needs of students and bring out their highest potential. The batches of respective academic year are assigned to a faculty member who acts as their guide and tutor for the entire programme duration. Tutors maintain and update the performance of students (class tests, monthly attendance records, etc.) and offer guidance and counselling when required. The Head of the Department monitors the performance of students and review the activities of tutors and advice them whenever the situation demands. The institution follows SSP and WWS scheme as per the guidelines of the university. The slow and difficult learners were supported with Student Support Program (SSP) so that assigned tutors will take care of 8 students to improve their academic performance. The students who excel in their academic field were brought under the Walk With A Scholar (WWS) programme the mentor will guide 6 students/ mentees to bring them to their highest potential in learning and other co-curricular activities and move along with them to achieve their future goals.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Students are evaluated by continuous and end semester assessments. A college level monitoring committee is functioning to supervise all evaluation processes in the credit and semester system. Class tests are conducted at the end of each module. Their performance in the practical classes also regularly monitored and evaluated at the end of the semester. All the departments follow a tutorial system to ensure individual care to students. Weak students are regularly monitored. Surprise tests are also periodically conducted by the department to ensure the regular involvement of students in classes. All the processes are done with the consultation of CLMC. After the test papers the results are communicated to the respective parents of those students who scored fewer marks in the examination.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution is affiliated to the University of Kerala and thus following the Academic Calendar published by the University. At the beginning of the year, an Academic Calendar (Annual Academic Plan) is prepared by the IQAC based on inputs from the University Academic Calendar and Departmental Academic Plans. The preparation of academic calendar ensures that the students get adequate instructional hours and teachers get maximum hours to deliver their courses effectively. The academic calendar is prepared in tune with the conduct of examinations. Schedule of Examinations: The proposed schedule of internal examinations (test paper component) is given in academic calendar so that the students can prepare for them well in advance. The internal assessments are carried out for each semester at the institution whereas the End Semester Evaluations are done by the University as per the prior schedules. The answer scripts will be evaluated at a centralized valuation camp.

Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities such as laboratories, library, sports facilities, computer labs and classrooms are as per rules and regulations stipulated by the Govt. of Kerala. Priority has been given for the proper maintenance of the infrastructural facilities. Allocation of funds for the maintenance of the infrastructure of the college is earmarked in the plan fund of the college by the directorate of collegiate education department. The state Public Works Department is assigned the technical supervision of the works. The laboratories are well equipped with a sufficient stock of equipment and other consumables as per the requirement utilizing the plan fund released by the Department of Collegiate Education. Separate laboratories are provided for the available UG and PG programmes. Repair and renovation works have been done annually to ensure the safety in laboratories as and when the grants are allotted which also include funds from PTA. The college has a well-stocked General library which is partially automated with a good repository of textbooks and reference books such that the students can access them as reference materials related to the syllabi and curricula along with periodicals, newspapers, and other academic publications. Books are purchased annually as per the requirement and suggestions received from the faculty as well as students utilizing the plan fund allotted by the collegiate education department. College has two playgrounds of which one is a multipurpose court which includes space for football and cricket and the other is a shuttle badminton court. Students are given training for cricket, football, volleyball, kabaddi, kho-kho, archery, fencing, shuttle badminton, athletics, powerlifting, weightlifting and roll ball. Recurring grants are ensured for the purchase of new sports goods and for the maintenance of existing facilities. The college has computer lab facilities which are utilized by the students as part of their curriculum. Regular service and maintenance of the computers are done with the use of plan funds and by the support of PTA funds. UPS and other supporting facilities required for the functioning of computers are ensured with the help of supporting funds. Separate classrooms are allotted for each batch of students and rooms are allotted as per the student strength. Sufficient furniture and other requirements of classrooms are ensured annually through plan funds provided by

the department of collegiate education. Repairing and painting works are timely done with the support of the Public Works Department of Govt. of Kerala. Apart from the students at the college who use the facilities, students of courses conducted by the Continuing Education Cell (CEC) also utilize the facilities of the college such as computer labs and classrooms. Classrooms are also allotted for exams conducted by Kerala Public Service, School of Distance Education, and University of Kerala as and when requested.

The College maintains a Blood Group Data Registry which is updated every academic year. Voluntary blood donors are the cornerstone of a safe and adequate supply of whole blood as well as components of blood such as plasma. The safest blood donors are voluntary, nonremunerated blood donors from lowrisk populations which include healthy individuals of relatively lower age group especially the college students. So as part of social commitment, the college regularly arranges blood donation campaigns. In the current academic year nearly 70 students and 8 faculty members have voluntarily participated in the blood donation. Apart from this as per the requirement, the students serve as blood donors for the nearby hospital blood banks. The students at this college along with the teaching and non-teaching staff have taken steps to provide mid-day meal to the needy bystanders of patients at Government Medical College, Thiruvananthapuram. Towards realizing this commitment, students as well as the teaching and non-teaching staff have initiated a programme whereby packed food from their respective homes were brought to the campus on a bimonthly basis and was arranged for distribution. The students of this college along with the NSS volunteers have taken initiative for public place cleaning, beautification and setting of organic vegetable garden at the nearby educational institutions. Campus Cleaning and planting of tree sapling were carried out in the campus. The plants around the campus was taxonomically identified and displays were exhibited showing their taxonomic identification.
