## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

Our institution was established as a constituent part of University College, Thiruvananthapuram in 1993-1994, with minimal infrastructural facilities. Later in 1997, it was renamed as Government College, Kariavattom. The College is located within Kazhakuttom ward of Thiruvananthapuram Corporation and is the only Government College within the limits of Kazhakootam constituency. The institution is in close proximity to the academic campus of University of Kerala, Technopark, and Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE). Digital University and other national research institutes like CTCRI, RGCB, SCTIMST and NCESS are well within the radius of our college.

The College has 15 acres of land and functions in five blocks (A,B, F, NK and Administrative Block). The physical infrastructure was expanded by constructing a ladies amenity center, canteen, toilet facilities for divyangjan, ducts for rainwater routing and toilet block for girls. Construction of the library cum research block, boys' toilet block and additional examination hall is under progress. As a sustainable development initiative, solar panels (130KV) and a biogas unit were also installed.

Our institution has eight major departments (Department of Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, and Statistics) and six minor departments (Department of Botany, English, Geology, Languages, Physical Education and Zoology). The college offers seven undergraduate programs (in Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry, Computer Science, Geography, Physics & Computer Application and Statistics); two postgraduate programs (in Physics and Mathematics) and one Doctoral program in Physics. The college has 600 plus students & 55 teaching faculties and nine are recognised research guides. There are 34 non-teaching staff members including 12 lab attenders.

Socially and economically backward students of the college are supported by various Schemes and Scholarships including Post Matric Minorities Scheme, Suvarna Jubilee Scholarship, State Merit Scholarship, District Merit Scholarship, C H Muhammed Koya Scholarship, Higher Education Scholarship, Research Award –Aspire, Snehapoorvam, Prof. Joseph Mundasseri and Hindi Scholarships.

The institution was accredited by NAAC with B-grade (2.47 score) in 2016. The quiet ambience and pollution free surroundings provide a peaceful environment to students. The College upholds the following Vision and Mission.

To be a nationally acclaimed institution of excellence in higher education, inculcating value-based quality education for upholding human nobility and the rich cultural heritage through various curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities devoted to the society.

#### **Land-area and Infrastructure**

- The college has 15 acres of land functioning in its own building with a total built area of 10868 m2.
- Adequate classrooms with ICT facilities (mounted/portable LCDs and Interactive intelligent panels), laboratories, automated library, two auditoriums, seminar halls, exam halls, separate staff rooms, RCC ducts, solar panels, biogas plant, CCTV surveillance, dedicated transformer, 300 mbps WiFi connectivity, canteen and toilet facilities.
- College has facilities for Divyangian including tactile tiles, ramps, hand rails for stairs and toilets.

#### **Sports Facilities**

- The college has a multipurpose playfield to conduct football, handball, cricket, rugby, archery and athletics.
- Sports facilities include courts for volleyball, kho-kho, kabaddi, badminton, skating kits and indoor facility for table-tennis and chess.
- A full-fledged fitness center with training equipment like treadmill, elliptical cross-trainer, upright bike, twister, multigym, bench press stand, squat stand, weight-bars, abdomen exerciser.

- College offers seven undergraduate, two postgraduate and one doctoral programs.
- Multi-disciplinary, inter-disciplinary and new-generation programs are offered by college in various subjects.
- Students have six second-language options including Malayalam, Hindi, Sanskrit, Tamil, Arabic and French.
- Seven certificate courses are conducted.
- College provides facilities for conducting job-oriented courses through Continuous Education Cell.

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- Postgraduate courses are offered only by two out of the seven major departments. Government has not sanctioned other PG programs even after repeated applications which inturn has limited the opportunity of getting research centers.
- College is a recognised research center only for physics.
- Limited interaction with R&D institutes and industries.
- Lack of international collaboration.
- Institution offers programs only in science disciplines and does not offer any major programs in Arts and Commerce subjects.
- The college lacks staff quarters and hostel facilities for students.
- As the majority of the programs offered are of undergraduate levels, direct placement options are limited.
- Institution lacks its own transport facility.
- College alumni association is in its infant stage.
- External fund generation for research purposes in the form of grants and projects is limited.

#### **Institutional Opportunity**

- Area suitable for development: The college has 15 acres of land, which can be utilized for infrastructure development.
- Scope for extension activities: LP/UP schools and residential areas of lower socio-economic background are in close vicinity to the college which provides opportunity to expand extension activities that can help these communities.
- Scope for research activities: College is in close proximity to University of Kerala and national institutes like Rajiv Gandhi Centre for Biotechnology (RGCB), National Institute for Interdisciplinary Science and Technology (NIIST), Sree Chitra Tirunal Institute for Medical Sciences and Technology (SCTIMST), Digital University and information technology hub like Technopark within 15km radius. This offers opportunity to both faculty and students for collaborative projects, institute visits and

#### • Promotion of sports:

- Lakshmibai National College of Physical Education (LNCPE) is in close proximity to the college which offers prospects to promote sports activities among students especially in swimming and cycling.
- The adjacency of Greenfield International Stadium to our college, provides opportunity for staff and students to witness/participate in national and international sports events.
- The college has multipurpose ground and sports specific courts suitable for conducting sports and games.
- Well equipped gymnasium offers provision for fitness activities to staff and students.
- **Scholarships for minorities:** The college has numerous students belonging to the minority class which invites several government funded scholarships that help students to pursue higher education.
- **Members of academic bodies:** Several of our faculties are members of academic bodies like Board of Studies and Academic Council, which provides opportunity to make effective contributions and interventions in the academic field including design of curriculum and policy making.
- Linguistic minority/foreign students: We have students from other states and countries like Russia, Yemen, Vietnam and Nigeria, which gives us an opportunity to understand varying cultures and traditions.
- Opportunity to learn foreign/regional languages: Provision to learn French, Tamil and Sanskrit as second language.

#### **Institutional Challenge**

- Lack of Autonomy: College functions as per the regulations and guidelines of the University and Directorate of Collegiate Education, hence cannot take independent decisions on the following:
  - Timely conduct of End-Semester Examinations and evaluation processes
  - Starting and ending of semesters
  - Utilization of funds and timely audits.
- **Time constraint:** Shortage of time for syllabus coverage and other activities within the stipulated time allotted for each semester by the university due to unforeseen reasons.

- **Frequent transfer:** Transfer of faculties to other colleges interrupts their long term plans in the institution.
- **Declining student intake:** Currently due to the surge in the number of students seeking overseas education, the institution may in future face a threat in decline of student intake.

#### 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

#### **Curricular Aspects**

Curriculum delivery is carried out in a well-planned and documented process through hybrid mode since the COVID pandemic. IQAC prepares an academic calendar at the beginning of every academic year based on the academic calendar published by the university. Commencement of classes, semester registration, exam notification and registration are at par with the academic calendar. All curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities are conducted through various programmes as per the academic calendar.

Curriculum of all UG Courses, implemented under CBCSS system has incorporated professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability to inculcate human values and ethics among the students. Undergraduate and postgraduate courses offered by the college have included experiential learning through project work/fieldwork/internship during final year of study.

Bridge courses are conducted at the beginning of the academic year for first year students to give an overview of the course and bridge the gap between school and college curriculum. Remedial classes are provided to required students after evaluating them through class tests/exams. Apart from direct interactive classes, the curriculum delivery is also carried out through online education platforms like LMS and Google classroom.

Government initiatives like Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP), Walk With Scholar (WWS) and Student Support Program (SSP) are conducted for the academic, skill and personality development of students. Seminars are organized to update students on recent developments. Add-on/Certificate courses are conducted by the Continuing Education Cell (CEC)/institution to provide additional knowledge and skills. Feedback on curriculum & facility is obtained from stakeholders and based on this actions are taken and reports are published on college website.

Faculty of the institution play a major role in curriculum design and development through representation in academic bodies like Academic Council and Board of Studies (BoS).

#### **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

Students gain admission to the college through a transparent single window mechanism followed by University of Kerala and allotment is done as per the sanctioned student strength and reservation regulations. Our institution has constantly maintained a desirable mentor/mentee ratio that enables quality teaching through one-to-one mentoring.

Our college adapts student centric innovative pedagogies that includes slow/advanced learner programs (remedial sessions, SSP, ASAP and WWS), participatory learning (peer teaching, group discussion and

seminars), experiential learning (internships, projects, institution/industry visits, field visits and community programs) apart from blended learning. Students are also facilitated with video lessons, study materials, E-books and quizzes through online education platforms like LMS and Google classroom to make the teaching learning process more individualized and dynamic.

To increase the efficiency and effectiveness of teaching and learning, we monitor the attainment of course and program outcome through continuous internal assessments, feedback and student satisfaction surveys. Complaints related to internal assessment are addressed through monitoring committees at department and college level.

Out of fifty six sanctioned posts, our institution has fifty five full time permanent teaching faculty who have been appointed by the Kerala PSC based on written exam and interview. Our faculty members are highly dedicated and the majority are highly qualified and have M.Phil, Ph. D or Postdoctoral experience. Skills and knowledge of recent advancements in respective areas of the teachers are updated by attending orientation/refresher courses in concerned disciplines and active participation in research.

#### Research, Innovations and Extension

Out of the fifty five faculties in our college, thirty seven are doctoral degree holders and nine among them are recognized research guides mentoring both full-time and part-time research scholars. The college partners with industries, training institutions, and state/central research institutions to enhance research and provide training for faculty and students. More than seventy five research papers (national and international) in peer-reviewed journals and eighteen book chapters have been published by the faculty of the college over the past five years. ICSSR and UGC-funded minor research projects have been undertaken by faculties. The institution has organized fifty two seminars/conferences/workshops at state/national level in several areas including IPR and Research Methodology to create multidisciplinary research collaborations. Through invited lectures and conferences, the institution has established a platform for interactive conversation between the faculty, students, and renowned academicians. The college has also made an effort in promoting the Indian Knowledge System (IKS) through curriculum and other co-curricular/extracurricular activities. Our college has instituted business incubation center and Earn While You Learn (EWYL) initiatives to aid the students in entrepreneurship education and training. Numerous extension activities and outreach programs have been organized through collaborative participation of NSS, NCC, SFS, various clubs, and departments to instill social responsibility among students through community engagements. The college has initiated diverse campaigns encompassing blood donation drives, anti drug awareness campaigns, environmental conservation initiatives, gender sensitization programs, flood relief activities, palliative care activities and observances of important national and international days. The college has received awards for best NSS volunteer, Student Palliative Care (twice) and Student for Society (SFS) bookathon in recognition for its contributions to community engagement.

Activities in participatory village including career guidance and orientation class about the newly introduced NEP-based four year degree program (FYUGP) for students, river rejuvenation programs, river bank mapping, socio-economic survey and lifestyle disease awareness campaigns, fosters participatory learning, experiential learning and social commitment among students and staff of the institution.

#### **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The college has a total land area of 15 acres and offers seven UG courses which includes B.Sc. courses in

Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Computer Science, Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry, Statistics, Geography and Physics & Computer Applications and two PG courses in Mathematics and Physics. Department of Physics is a recognised center for research under University of Kerala.

The institution has four Academic blocks (A, B, F and NK), Administrative block, Physical Education Block, Girls Toilet Block, College Canteen, Ladies Amenities Centre and Powerhouse making a total built area of 10868 m2. There are 38 classrooms and 18 laboratories including well-equipped labs like microprocessor labs, electronics lab, computer lab, analytical and clinical biochemistry lab, tissue culture lab, geoinformatics lab, statistics lab etc. Labs are equipped with instruments like PCR machine, -20 deep-freezer, LAF, mini-weather station, GPS, soil-moisture meter, Indian Clinometer, dumpy level, petrological microscope, muffle furnace, Abbe's refractometer, Fabry-Perot interferometer, Michelson Interferometer, Workstation-Intel Xeon Processor for mass data processing, Programmable high-temperature furnace, Zeeman effect apparatus, Millikan's Oil drop apparatus etc.

The college has two ICT-enabled seminar halls, a video center (ORICE), an incubation center (OERC) and two exam halls with a seating capacity of 120 each. Classrooms are ICT-enabled with portable/ mounted LCD projectors. PG classrooms are provided with intelligent-interactive smartboards. College has implemented MOODLE-based LMS since 2021. The institution has established a Local Chapter of Swayam-NPTEL for fostering online education. There are a total of 192 computers and the entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled.

General library is fully automated with ILMS-KOHA version 21.05. UGC-INFLIBNET accounts are provided to both faculty and students to access scholarly information and resources.

As part of green initiatives the college has installed solar panels (130 KVA), biogas plant, compost pits, well-recharging facility and a medicinal-plant garden. Provision for safe drinking water and uninterrupted electricity supply is also provided.

College has adequate facilities for sports, games, physical fitness (a well equipped gymnasium) and cultural activities (open-air/mini auditorium). Sports facilities in the college include badminton and volleyball court, multipurpose ground, and a recreation center with indoor games like table tennis, chess etc.

#### **Student Support and Progression**

Recognizing students as the primary stakeholders, our teaching and non-teaching staff serve as robust support systems for students' progression, empowerment, and skill development through various student-centric measures. We ensure timely disbursement of government-supported scholarships and free ships, which facilitate students in successful completion of their course. Approximately 75% of our student body avail of the aforementioned schemes. First-year students are offered bridge course at start of the academic year to provide an overview of the chosen course and minimize curricular gap between school and college. Academic support, including initiatives like SSP, WWS, ASAP, and coaching classes for competitive exams, boosts students' performance, leading to considerable numbers qualifying for state/national level competitive examinations. The career-oriented UG programs offered by our institution have been functioning exceptionally well. Add-on/certificate courses are offered to students to supplement their core curriculum and enhance additional skills and knowledge relevant to field of study. Coaching for PG entrance examinations is conducted by various departments which has enabled considerable number of students to gain admission to higher education

institutions.

The institution focuses on capacity development and skill enhancement activities to improve students' capabilities and social responsibility, with commendable contributions from NSS and NCC. Student expression also flourishes through diverse club activities, celebrations of festivals and observance of important days of national/international significance. Supported by Students Union, the institution conducts various arts and literary competitions to showcase and encourage students' talents, fostering a vibrant campus culture. Student achievements, spanning from academic ranks to winning medals in various sports endeavors, highlight the institution's commitment to the student community. Recognition in sports arena extends to international platforms, with students participating in the Taekwondo and Kho Kho competition.

Career Guidance and Placement Cell emphasizes on education over immediate job placement, in line with students' preferences for higher education pursuits. Our college alumni also significantly support outgoing students in finding jobs, projects, and business opportunities. The institution's transparent grievance mechanism swiftly addresses student concerns related to both academic and non-academic matters. The Jeevani Centre, addressing mental well-being, identifies and tackles psychological issues and provides professional help to needy students.

#### Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution ensures that all the stakeholders work effectively towards attaining the vision and mission of the college. Major decisions regarding academic, administrative, financial, and disciplinary activities are taken by the College Council, the apex body, having representation from teaching/non-teaching staff and students. The decisions are implemented through IQAC, College Development Committee, Planning & Purchase committee, Academic Program Committee, College Level Monitoring Committee, and Staff advisor. Students IQAC constituted with student members representing all departments, assists IQAC in quality improvement and assurance of the college.

The IQAC ensures the conduct of quality initiative programmes including seminars, workshops, remedial classes, internal examinations, feedback & result analysis, training on NEP & OBE, Digilocker, e-grantz and patent rights. IQAC has initiated workshops on learning management platforms like LMS to enhance skills on blended learning and microteaching. Faculty enroll into various FDPs to upgrade their knowledge and skills. Other significant initiatives include automation of the college library, 'Adukkalathottam-organic farming', waste management system, solar energy initiatives and setting up of green campus. Institute/ industrial visits are conducted for the students every year to foster experiential learning.

To foster experiential learning and instill social commitment among students, IQAC has initiated several programs like river bank mapping, socioeconomic survey, lifestyle disease campaign & blood test, donation of books and career guidance classes in participatory village at Pullampara. Several welfare schemes are implemented for the staff as per government norms. The College was also a venue for HSST training of Maths teachers in collaboration with the Higher Secondary Education Dept. The college follows policies implemented by the DCE, laid down by the Ministry of Higher Education, Government of Kerala. Implementation of e-governance in the Institution is supported through DDFS, SPARK, PFMS, BiMS, CPRCS and GeM portal, University of Kerala portal and SLCM.

The merit based recruitment of teaching/non-teaching staff is carried out by Kerala PSC and service matters are executed in accordance with the UGC guidelines/KSR (Kerala Service Rules). The performance appraisal

system for teaching follows the PBAS proforma and performance of non-teaching staff is evaluated by the Directorate of Collegiate Education.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college promotes holistic development of students through experiential learning by engaging them in various activities including social service. This approach resonates with traditional Indian values of compassion and empathy, broadening the educational experience beyond academic realms. Our institution promotes gender equity through programs like self-defense training and awareness sessions on women's rights and menstrual hygiene. Collaborations with external organizations aid in sensitization campaigns against gender-based violence and dowry system. The institution fosters an inclusive environment through cultural events, civic engagement, and socio-economic initiatives. Notably, the "Healing Hearts: Illuminating Hope for Bedridden Patients" initiative demonstrates the commitment of college to community welfare. Through its 'Prathidhi' Palliative Club, the college provides holistic care for bedridden patients, addressing physical, emotional, and financial needs. Collaboration with 'Jeevani' counseling center for psychological support and community engagement reflect a comprehensive approach. Success is evident in patient support, community involvement, and sustained efforts despite resource constraints. By prioritizing community welfare alongside academic pursuits, our college exemplifies transformative potential of higher education in creating socially responsible citizens and fostering inclusive environments.

Moreover, the college engages in socio-economic development initiatives, disaster relief efforts, and environmental conservation programs in collaboration with the local community, NGOs, and government agencies. Activities like blood donation camps, cleanliness drives, and awareness campaigns on health and environmental issues cultivate culture of service and social responsibility. Through regular assessment and strategic planning, the college aims to enhance its performance and contribute to the holistic development of its students and the community.

Aligned with our vision that the ultimate goal of education is to cultivate socially responsible citizens dedicated to the welfare of their community and society, the college has launched the 'Nattuvelicham' initiative, a participatory village program. Extension activity involves students in various endeavors like community service, awareness sessions, ecological conservation projects, and health campaigns. Collaborating closely with local self-government of Pullampara Panchayat in Thiruvananthapuram, these activities aim to enhance the socio-economic conditions of Pullampara's residents while safeguarding its ecological heritage. By fostering meaningful interactions between the college and village community, the program promotes a shared sense of ethical responsibility as members of society.

#### **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Our institution offers specialized courses that focus on career advancement and employability of students which includes two restructured courses (core/vocational) and a multi-major course. The college offers B.Sc. Biotechnology, a Multi-Major Program, where students learn Biotechnology, Chemistry and Zoology/Botany as core courses. BSc Physics and Computer Application is an undergraduate program with Physics as core course and Computer application as vocational course. BSc Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry is another undergraduate program with Chemistry as core course and Industrial Chemistry as the vocational course. Other undergraduate programs offered by our

college include B.Sc. Programs in Biochemistry, Geography, Computer Science and Statistics. All B.Sc. Programs include complementary course/s which is a subject different from the core course. As per the curriculum designed by the University, all B.Sc. students learn English as first language (in the first four semesters). B.Sc. Biochemistry, Chemistry & Industrial Chemistry, Physics & Computer Applications, Statistics and Geography students have an additional second language course (Malayalam/Hindi/ Sanskrit/Tamil/Arabic/French) in the first four semesters. Sanskrit and Hindi courses open avenues for students to understand more about Indian culture and heritage. Tamil is provided as an additional language to instill interest and awareness about our neighboring state. Foreign languages namely Arabic and French are offered to foster global integrity and enhance overseas employability. Each department in the college offers open courses for UG which students can opt outside their core course in the fifth semester. Apart from that an additional generic add-on/certificate course (optional) is offered, where students can choose subjects of their interest, outside the core and complementary areas. B.Sc. Programmes also include Environment Science/Value Education courses as Foundation Course in the first year. Students are encouraged to select interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary areas as project domains. The college also organizes seminar/field work that encompasses collaboration among various disciplines. The NEP-based Four Year UG Program (FYUGP) launched in the current academic year has introduced two streams of interdisciplinary courses (Biotechnology and Physics & Computer Applications). Majority of the faculty pursue research in interdisciplinary/multidisciplinary areas in collaboration with various Research Institutes and Universities.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Our institution is affiliated with the University of Kerala, which has recently implemented the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system as part of the National Education Policy (NEP). This system facilitates seamless student mobility across institutions by enabling credit transfers, thus enhancing academic flexibility. In response to this, our institution has undertaken several initiatives to ensure that our students are well-prepared to adopt

the ABC system. We have conducted programs for students highlighting the benefits of the ABC system, to create awareness regarding the facility to accumulate credits from different institutions and the opportunity for a more tailored educational journey. In this context the college organized a seminar titled "Academic Bank of Credits: in NEP Perspective," which brought together faculty and students to discuss and understand the intricacies of the ABC system. To align with digital innovations in education, the ABC system has been integrated into the Digi Locker framework, and all students enrolled under the NEP-based FYUGP were made to register in Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry (APAAR). .This proactive measure ensures that our students are ready to take full advantage of the ABC system, even if the immediate benefits are more relevant to their future academic endeavors. Additionally, we continue to promote SWAYAM/NPTEL and other MOOC courses as complementary to the ABC system. As a registered local chapter of SWAYAM-NPTEL, we facilitate student participation in various online talks and courses offered by National Institutes, which further enrich their academic experience.

#### 3. Skill development:

The college has organized various skill development programs for students. Activities of NSS, NCC and various clubs of the college have guided the students in content creation (video, flyers, posters, reports, etc) and other activities which improved their artistic, comprehensive, public speaking, event management, planning and leadership skills. Skill development session was organized during the Annual Residential Camp of NSS, where students were trained to make agarbatti, lotion and paper bags. They were also trained in developing life skills like cooking, gardening and community living. Programs related to agriculture like "Adukalathottam", "Haritham" and integrated fish farming under the EWYL scheme, have enhanced the farming skills of students. These programs have familiarized the students with drip irrigation and wick irrigation techniques. The French Food Festival - La Fête Nationale (2018-19) and BOUCHÉES D'AMOUR' (2022-23), organized by the Department of French nurtured the French culinary skills of students. Students are delegated with responsibilities and duties in

seminars/workshops organized by the college which has enhanced their organizing and management skills. Language courses included in the curriculum of all B.Sc. Programmes work towards development of communication skills in English and other regional/foreign languages through interactive quiz, enactment of prescribed plays, recital of prescribed poems, figurative and critical analysis of literary texts, model teaching sessions by students, orientation sessions on creative writing, vocabulary building activities and listening-speaking-readingwriting enhancement activities. A session on "Developing Reading and Writing Skills" led by Smt. Khyrunnisa A during the Annual Camp of NSS instilled reading interest among the students. Practical courses under B.Sc. Computer Science and Physics & Computer Application Programmes offered by our institution focuses on improving the Programming and Logic Development Skills of the students. In general, all practical courses and handson training given for the dissertation work done for projects as part of the curriculum has enhanced the application level skills of students in their Core/Complementary domain areas. The recently launched NEP-based Four Year Undergraduate Program (FYUGP), has integrated numerous Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) in the curriculum, which aims at developing and improving the skills of students based on their interest in respective disciplines.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

Appropriate integration of the Indian Knowledge System in the curriculum has oriented the students towards improving holistic learning skills. Teaching in Indian Language: Our institution offers courses in additional languages (Malayalam, Hindi, Sanskrit and Tamil) for which the faculty members deliver the content of the syllabus and interact with the students in the respective language. Teaching/technical sessions are also handled in bilingual mode. Culture: Students are acquainted with the diverse Indian cultures through various courses offered in the curriculum. Different types of literary forms, such as novels, short stories, dramas, plays, biography and memoir are included in the syllabus. These are prescribed to understand the cultural diversity of our Nation. In Sanskrit education, learning is fostered

through the introduction of literary works by renowned Sanskrit scholars from diverse regions of India, highlighting their significant contributions to Sanskrit literature. The topic 'Thamizhar Nagarigamum Panpadum' (Tamil Civilization and Culture); in the Tamil language course depicts various facets of Indian culture including food and beliefs, attire, wedding styles, various religious and cultural festivals. Apart from curriculum content, an online quiz on Indian culture and heritage was conducted by the NSS unit on World Heritage Day, and NSS Volunteers visited Kuthiramalika Palace to understand the rich cultural heritage of the Princely State of Travancore. The College has given utmost thrust to the benefits of practicing Yoga in daily life. Every year, International Yoga Day has been observed by organizing yoga training sessions by yoga experts for the students and staff of the college. The students have participated in Yogathon, a mass yoga practice session held in connection with the international Yoga day at Jimmy George Indoor Stadium. Indian Knowledge System and Indian culture have also been conveyed to the students through online platforms. Online sessions on the significance of Yoga have been conducted through the demonstration of different 'Asanas' which was intended to propagate yoga among the public. An addon/certificate course 'Functional Tamil' has been offered in a hybrid mode (online/offline), by the Department of Tamil, which aims at improving the reading and writing skills of students in Tamil language. The newly introduced Four Year Undergraduate Program (FYUGP), aligned with the NEP, places significant emphasis on integrating Indian Knowledge Systems and cultural heritage in its curriculum.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The curriculum at the University of Kerala is designed with a strong emphasis on Outcome Based Education (OBE). This approach ensures that all B.Sc. Programmes encompass a set of Programme Outcomes (POs), which include Critical Thinking, Problem Solving, Computational Thinking, Effective Communication, Social Interaction, Self-directed and Life-long Learning, Effective Citizenship, Ethics, Environment and Sustainability and Global Perspective. Each Programme has Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) that define the unique

competencies students are expected to acquire. Furthermore, every course within a Programme has a set of 5 to 6 Course Outcomes (COs) based on Bloom's Taxonomy. These COs guide the curriculum delivery and assessment processes to ensure that learning objectives are met. Our institution is committed to foster an outcome-based perspective in students through a combination of lectures, tutorials, practical sessions, and participative learning activities. The attainment of COs is meticulously evaluated through internal examinations, class test papers, assignments, and course exit surveys. This rigorous assessment ensures that the courses are designed and delivered to achieve the intended POs, PSOs, and COs. Faculty serving as members of Board of Studies (Bo S) of various disciplines play a crucial role in recommending syllabus amendments to the Academic Council, ensuring that the curriculum remains relevant and responsive to the evolving educational landscape.

#### 6. Distance education/online education:

As part of promoting blended learning, our institution has been utilizing a MOODLE-based Learning Management System (LMS) since October 2021. This platform allows teachers to post course materials in various formats, such as Lessons, Pages, URLs, and Books, facilitating diverse modes of content delivery. Online assessments are conducted through assignments and quizzes, providing a flexible and accessible means of evaluating student performance. Discussion forums within the LMS serve as an interactive space for students to clarify concepts and resolve doubts, fostering a collaborative learning environment. Students have the opportunity to provide feedback on course content, teaching methodology, and assessment processes through LMS survey tools. In a significant step towards promoting online education, the College Council and IQAC have decided to make our institution a Local Chapter of SWAYAM-NPTEL. This initiative will further enhance our capacity to offer high-quality online courses and support students in accessing a wide range of educational resources. Additionally, IQAC has proposed the development and offering of online courses in various domains, including regional languages, to cater to the diverse needs of our student community. This initiative aims to expand our educational reach and provide students with more

flexible learning options.

#### **Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy**

1. Whether Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) has been set up in the College?

Yes. The College has an Electoral Literacy Club comprising the following members. Convenor- Sri. Sudheer B. (Department of Chemistry), Faculty members- Sri. Manoj KS (Department of Malayalam), Dr. Prakash A (Department of Hindi), Dr. Nishad N (Department of Geography), Dr. Dhanya CR (Department of Biochemistry) and student members.

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

Yes, the College has appointed a Student Coordinator and Coordinating Faculty Member as per proceedings issued by the Principal. The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) is fully functional and plays a significant role in promoting electoral literacy through various programs and activities. The ELC is representative in character, comprising members from both the faculty and the student community. This inclusive structure ensures diverse perspectives and active participation from all segments of the college. The initiatives of the ELC are designed to engage and educate students on the importance of electoral processes, thereby fostering a culture of informed and responsible citizenship within the college.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

The Electoral Literacy Club (ELC) of the College has conducted awareness programs related to electoral literacy to sensitize all the students regarding their rights as citizens and their individual role in upholding democratic values. The ELC has taken initiatives to enroll more than 95% of our students in the electoral list. ELC has actively involved in the following: Voluntary Contributions by Students in Electoral Processes: The ELC actively encourages students to participate in various electoral processes. Students volunteer to assist in voter registration drives both within the college and in their home communities. This initiative ensures that students and their families are registered voters, thereby increasing voter participation. Voter Awareness Campaigns: The ELC organizes extensive voter awareness campaigns including digital campaigning, workshops and seminars within the campus and in surrounding

communities. These campaigns motivate voters to participate in elections and educate them regarding the electoral process and the impact of voting on democracy. Enhancing Participation of Underprivileged Sections: We are committed to increase the electoral participation of underprivileged sections of society. Students have taken initiatives to ensure the participation of transgender individuals, disabled persons and senior citizens in the election process in their respective constituencies.

4. Any socially relevant projects/initiatives taken by College in electoral related issues especially research projects, surveys, awareness drives, creating content, publications highlighting their contribution to advancing democratic values and participation in electoral processes, etc.

The college is committed in promoting democratic values and enhancing participation in electoral processes through a range of socially relevant projects and initiatives as follows. Electoral Awareness Drives: The college regularly organizes electoral awareness drives aimed at educating students and the local community about the importance of voting. These drives include awareness campaigns, workshops and surveys. The initiatives focus on informing citizens about their voting rights, the electoral process and the significance of ethical voting. Creation of Educational Content: To promote electoral literacy, we have created a variety of educational content, including pamphlets, brochures, videos, and infographics. These materials were circulated in the college and in local communities, ensuring that accurate and accessible information about elections reaches a wide audience. Workshops and Seminars on Electoral Topics: The ELC has hosted workshops/seminars to provide a platform for discussing contemporary electoral issues and exploring ways to improve electoral participation. Topics include the role of technology in elections and promoting inclusivity in the voting process. Collaborations with Electoral Bodies: The College collaborates with local electoral bodies to support electoral activities. This includes partnering with the Election Commission to conduct voter registration drives, organizing training sessions for polling officers and facilitating electoral roll updates. Such collaborations enhance the practical understanding of electoral processes among the students and staff. Our faculty members Prof. (Dr.) Gladston Raj S, served as a State Level Master Trainer; Mr. Manoj KS as Team Captain of Static Surveillance Team (SST); and Dr. Nishad N as a Sectoral Magistrate (Kerala Legislative Assembly Election 2021) and Team

Leader, Flying Squad in the Parliament Election 2024. Majority of the teaching/non-teaching staff has contributed to the electoral process as Presiding/Polling officers. Creating content: The ELC club convenor Sri.Sudheer B and the NCC unit of the college has created pamphlets, brochures and video contents in connection with electoral literacy and registration of voters.

5. Extent of students above 18 years who are yet to be enrolled as voters in the electoral roll and efforts by ELCs as well as efforts by the College to institutionalize mechanisms to register eligible students as voters.

The college is committed to ensure that all eligible students are registered as voters. Through the combined efforts of the Electoral Literacy Club and institutional mechanisms, the college strives to promote democratic participation and empower students to exercise their voting rights. Based on a previous survey, approximately 40% of students above 18 years of age were yet to be registered as voters. This statistics had highlighted the need for targeted initiatives to increase voter registration among our students. The ELC took initiatives in the form of awareness campaigns (workshops/seminars), voter registration drives and creating video content related to electoral literacy, to motivate student registration in the electoral role thereby ensuring their participation in the voting process. Latest survey indicates that more than 95% of the students have successfully registered and participated in the recent parliamentary election. These initiatives reflect our dedication to fostering informed and active citizens who contribute to the democratic process.

## **Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects**

### 1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

#### 1.1.1

The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

#### **Response:**

Curriculum delivery follows a well-organized and documented process. The university releases the annual academic calendar, on the basis of which the academic calendar of the college is prepared. Each department adheres to the master timetable based on which the departmental timetable is scheduled. The university periodically intervenes to update the academic calendar and curriculum as needed. To ensure effective curriculum delivery, the faculty maintains a work diary that includes course plans and records of course delivery. A student attendance register is maintained to mark the hourly attendance manually which is consolidated at the end of each semester.

Apart from the conventional teaching methods, ICT enabled teaching is also practiced in the college. Lecture notes and digital textbooks are made accessible to students through an LMS platform. Bridge courses are conducted in some departments to prepare students to handle the academic syllabi effectively. Students are assessed through class tests, assignments and seminars and are encouraged to participate in debates, quizzes, and group presentations. Peer teaching is arranged to enhance the skill of advanced learners and to assist the slow learners in academics. Special classes are conducted to ensure timely completion of the course content. Remedial classes are provided to needy students with special emphasis on discussing the questions being frequently asked in university exams. Seminars by external experts on recent developments in various subjects keep students informed and updated in their respective fields. Continuous evaluation marks are published, and remedial exams are offered to help students improve their internal marks. The students have access to well-equipped laboratory facilities, supported by government funds. Study tours are also organized as part of the curriculum. All activities related to a department are discussed and finalized through DLMC meeting.

The college organizes club activities aimed at giving students practical experiences outside their curriculum. Outstanding students are recognized and assigned mentors through the Walk with Scholar Program to support their holistic development. The slow learners are identified and provided with additional classes for the courses they need through the Student Support Program. Monitoring of all these activities ensures that curriculum delivery is effectively planned and executed.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

#### 1.3.1

Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability in transacting the Curriculum

#### **Response:**

The curriculum for all undergraduate courses in Computer Science, Industrial Chemistry, Geography, Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Physics, Computer Applications, English, Tamil, and Sanskrit includes components on professional ethics, gender, human values, environment, and sustainability. While the syllabi are designed by the Board of Studies of the University of Kerala, Environmental Studies is a mandatory course for all UG programs, covering topics such as environmental protection, biodiversity, and conservation. Additionally, language courses for degree programs guide students on how to respond empathetically to societal issues. Courses under the Physical Education department also include topics on human values and professional ethics.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

#### 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

#### **Response:**

Government College Kariavattom, being an affiliated college to University of Kerala, follows the regulations laid down by the university in internal assessment/ Continuous Assessment (CA) for all CBCS and CR courses. During the induction programs that the college offers for the first year students following their admission, they are introduced to the format and procedures for internal and external exams.

Internal assessment criteria in the university regulations are published on the college website and also explained by the teachers. The dates of internal exams and assignments are published on the notice board and also informed by the class tutors and HoDs. The transparent and student-friendly organization of internal exams is managed by the Internal/Model Examination Committee. Under the direction of the Convenor of Internal Examinations, the committee is in charge of question paper setting, invigilation responsibilities, and valuation of answer script. The Anti Malpractice internal Squad makes sure that students recognize the importance of the internal exams. CCTV cameras monitor the exam process for added transparency. After exams, teachers evaluate answer scripts and return them to students within two weeks for review. This allows students to verify their marks. Teachers compile Continuous Evaluation (CE) marks following University guidelines. Once students confirm and sign, the signed mark document is forwarded to faculty advisors/ Class tutors for verification and consolidation. Department heads verify the marks before they reach the Principal for final verification and submission to the University. A copy of this signed document is maintained in the department for records and future reference.

The University of Kerala conducts End semester examinations at the college, adhering to its regulations. The Chief Superintendent, assisted by a Deputy Superintendent and other staff in the examination

committee, oversees these exams. The External Examination Committee informs students about exam procedures and emphasizes the presence of CCTV cameras and surprise inspections by the University's Anti-Malpractice Squad to deter cheating. Every day, the classrooms assigned for each student's external examination are rearranged as part of the institution's effort to reduce malpractices. A proper ratio of students to invigilator ratio is maintained as instructed by the University for efficient invigilation.

Students have multiple channels to address exam-related grievances: the Grievance Redressal Cell, the Department-Level Monitoring Committee, the College-Level Monitoring Committee, and the University-Level Monitoring Committee. They can even log on to the link on the college website and enter their grievances online. The grievances are redressed through measures like retests, revaluation of answer scripts, and resubmission of assignments. Unresolved grievances are escalated to the DLMC, led by the Head of the Department. If the issue remains unresolved, it's forwarded to the College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC).

### 2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

#### 2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

#### **Response:**

Nowadays, higher education is increasingly emphasizing transparency and accountability. Institutions are achieving this in one way, by clearly outlining Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all their programs. These outcomes serve as a kind of road map, outlining the attitudes, abilities, and information that students should acquire after successfully completing a course or program.

The syllabus and curricula of various programmes offered by the college are designed by the respective Board of Studies under University of Kerala. The Programme Outcome (PO), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO) and Course Outcomes (CO) are stated in the syllabus, and all these documents are available on the college website. For certain programs, the university implemented outcome-based education in 2021, and for others, in 2022. Once the Four Year UnderGraduate Programme is implemented, all programmes will become outcome-based and POs, PSOs and COs will be duly updated. Currently for programmes, where outcome-based syllabus is not provided by the University, the faculties of concerned departments, under the supervision of IQAC, prepare and provide a desirable outcome based on the syllabus of their courses offered.

The importance of learning outcomes is discussed in various committees including IQAC, college council and department level meetings. Soft copies of syllabus with PSOs and COs are shared

with the students through the Learning Management System. A printed copy of syllabi of programmes offered by departments is made available in each department for reference of teachers and students. Students are made aware of these outcomes through orientation programmes conducted during the beginning of each academic year at the college level and department level. At the beginning of each course, teachers effectively communicate the outcomes of the course which they teach to the students. Faculty members of our institution play a key role in the drafting of PSOs and COs throughout the revision/drafting of the syllabus and so have an expertise in the same. The POs, PSOs and COs are communicated to the faculty members through College Level Monitoring Committee and in Departmental Council meetings.

The college website, orientation programmes, and the syllabus of the courses serve as early sources of information for students regarding the educational outcomes, POs, PSOs, and COs.

IQAC has also conducted a Faculty Development Program on Learning Management System and Outcome Based Education. During this FDP, teachers were provided with sessions regarding Outcome Based Education, Bloom's taxonomy and the relevance of POs, PSOs and COs. Teachers were also made aware of its role in assessing the quality of course delivery and evaluation. As a part of institution preparedness for NEP, various awareness programmes were also conducted by IQAC for students and faculty members to make them aware of the importance of NEP, Outcome based education and the Four Year Under Graduate Programme being introduced in 2024-25.

POs and PSOs are also displayed at various key locations in the institution including Department Staff Rooms so that students and teachers are continiously aware of them and also the updates made.

#### **Response:**

The University of Kerala designed the curriculum, which the college adheres to and includes detailed descriptions of Course Outcomes (COs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Programme Outcomes (POs). Every course has defined COs, which are mapped to the POs and PSOs. The quantitative evaluation of COs is done using a set of performance evaluation criteria. CO accomplishment serves as a proof that POs and PSOs have also been attained. Both quantitative and qualitative measures are to be considered for the attainment computation. The institution uses direct and indirect methods to assess COs, PSOs and PSOs and is monitored by the College level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) and IQAC.

At the beginning of each course, the teacher devices various instruments to assess the students' progress toward outcomes through a detailed semester plan. Effective assessment tools are used for continuous evaluation to ensure attainment of expected outcomes. The evaluation scheme comprises two parts: 20% for internal and 80% for external assessments. Continuous evaluation of students are assessed through classroom participation, assignments, viva, seminars, internal tests, etc. The summative end semester assessment is done by the University and marks are awarded after external evaluation.

Teachers use innovative informal assessments to gauge the understanding of learners of the content. The internal tests are conducted based on the COs as stated in the syllabus and are mentioned in the question papers during internal examinations. The outcomes that are not covered through internal tests will be met through assignments. The college follows a uniform CO based assignment format that covers the outcome, how it is evaluated and remarks on its attainment. The seminar sessions evaluate the contents and execution of the presentation by the learner. We also started an attempt to collect feedback from students through a course-exit survey. The count of students who are placed or join for higher studies by cracking entrance examinations also serve as a good measure for the institution to analyze PO attainment. Course Exit Survey is taken from the students after the completion of the respective course.

Student ability is also gauged based on their in-depth knowledge of the subject.through methods such as Paper Presentations, Quizzing, Peer teaching, practical examinations and Projects.

The above-mentioned aspects are analyzed by both the departments and IQAC coordinator. The college clubs and forums assess the literary, artistic and scientific temper of students. The department of physical education evaluates the performance and skills of students in sports and games. The institution also supports the accomplishment of learning goals by providing programs such as: Distinguished Alumni Lectures/invited lectures/ national seminars, Various resources made available in the library and INFLIBNET. Various innovative practices like community development programmes, and environmental awareness initiatives.

In order to encourage the students to strive towards the achievement of POs and COs, the college has instituted merit day awards for the students who excel in academics. The attainment of ranks at university level and the good number of students who progress into higher education, prove the efficacy of these efforts.

### 3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS),including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

#### **Response:**

Our institution created an ecosystem for innovations for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology by cultivating skilled human resources, advancing knowledge dissemination, and offering cutting-edge facilities. Our institute prioritizes dynamic faculty recruitment and mentorship to nurture young talent, promoting research and innovation. Initiatives supporting faculty research and skill enhancement are encouraged, and facilitated by an active Research Cell. Students are motivated to pursue external training and internships. Over the past five years, we've hosted 88 seminars and workshops, fostering multidisciplinary research collaborations. Invited lectures and conferences provide a platform for faculty, students, and esteemed academics to engage in interactive dialogue. Permanent faculty members have contributed 95 peer-reviewed journal publications and 32 book chapters (1). Emphasizing the value of Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), we conduct seminars and interactive sessions, enhancing awareness and fostering an environment conducive to invention and advancement (2, 3).

Government College Kariavattom (GCK) has launched a number of programs to support entrepreneurship education and training. Entrepreneurship Club conducts several programs to promote this (4). GCK, with support from KSIDC (Kerala State Industrial Development Corporation Limited), launched a Business Incubation Center in 2017, promoting innovation and startups. The 900 sqft center is the fifth in Kerala, fostering student innovators' ideas into viable enterprises through essential infrastructure and entrepreneurship education, aligning with KSIDC's mission (5).

GCK has a well-functioning Career Development and Placement Cell which aims at creating awareness among the students regarding various job opportunities and employment skills which are prerequisites for the challenging times. The cell organized lectures, interactive sessions, and orientation classes for graduate and postgraduate students, fostering personality development and boosting self-assurance for success in tests and interviews (6).

The Earn While You Learn (EWYL) Hub, launched in 2022 with aid from the Department of Collegiate Education, Government of Kerala, enables students to gain job experience alongside their studies, enhancing their employability and job readiness. Through the EWYL Hub, various initiatives have been executed on campus, including organic vegetable farming and integrated aquaculture systems, engaging over 80 students (7)

For knowledge creation and transfer, our institution implements student support programs like Walk With a Scholar (WWS) and the Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP). WWS offers mentoring from the first semester (8), while ASAP enhances employability, bridging academia-industry gaps. Faculty-guided orientation and training sessions optimize student placement (9).

GCK stands out as a top college participating in the Young Innovators Programme (YIP) under the Kerala Development and Innovation Strategy Council (K-DISC). A faculty member serves as Nodal Officer, facilitating collaboration between the college and K-DISC. Through YIP, we empower students to innovate solutions, products, or services addressing societal needs. Two ideas from the previous academic year are currently undergoing evaluation during 2022-23 (10).

Our institution serves as a subcenter for the Centre for Continuing Education Kerala (CCEK), with a permanent faculty member acting as Manager and the Principal as president (11). The CCEK promotes continuing education in technical fields, industry, business, and social improvement.

The labs are equipped with instruments like PCR machine, -20 deep-freezer, LAF, colony-counter, electrophoresis apparatus, bacteriological incubator, UV-Visible spectrophotometer, mini-weather station, GPS, soil-moisture meter, Indian Clinometer, dumpy level, petrological microscope, muffle furnace, Abbe's refractometer, Fabry-Perot interferometer, Michelson Interferometer, Workstation-Intel Xeon Processor, Programmable-high-temperature furnace, Zeeman effect apparatus, Millikan's Oil drop apparatus etc.

The college has two ICT enabled seminar halls, an ORICE center, incubation centre (OERC) and two exam halls (seating capacity 120 each). Classrooms are ICT enabled with either portable or fixed LCD projectors. Two PG classrooms are provided with intelligent-interactive smart boards. The institution has implemented a MOODLE-based LMS since 2021. College has established a Local Chapter of Swayam-NPTEL for fostering online education. There are a total of 192 computers and the entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled, providing optimal ICT facility.

College has a store cum reprographic centre for students to meet supplies for academic purpose. Various green initiatives are implemented which aims at sustainability and environmental conservation such as installation of solar panels (130 KVA), biogas plant, compost pits, well recharging facility and a medicinal plant garden. Provision for safe drinking water and uninterrupted electricity supply is ensured. Divyangjan facilities are provided with 2 accessible toilets, handrails on stairs, ramps and tactile tiles.

Our college has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games, and gymnasium. The physical education department has accessories for cricket, football, volleyball, rugby, handball, skating, squash, badminton, boxing, and table tennis. College has a well-equipped gymnasium with plate loaded biceps/triceps combination stand, Olympic flat bench press, squat stand, double twister, elliptical, treadmill, bench press stand, upright bike, Olympic bar, and 5-station multigym. Sports facility include badminton court (15.50m x 8m), football & athletic ground (100m x 50m), multipurpose ground (45m x 23 m), fitness centre (15m x 10m) and a recreation centre. Training is given for archery, chess, kabaddi, kho-kho, table-tennis, badminton, roll-ball, cycling, fencing, weightlifting and athletics. The college has

an open-air auditorium where cultural activities of students are conducted. Yoga day is observed and yoga practice is provided for students, teaching and non-teaching staff of our institution.

### 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

#### 4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

#### **Response:**

The General Library of Government College Kariavattom is fully automated with Integrated Library Management Software (ILMS)-KOHA version 21.05 since September 2021, ensuring up-to-date features and functionalities for optimal management of library resources, making it effortless for students and faculty to search for books by title, author, or publisher. The college library KOHA URL is available through the IP http://192.168.1.200:8081. KOHA is installed on a local server and can be accessed via the college LAN. Faculty or students visiting the library can utilize the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) and other internet resources through five desktop computers provided in the library. The department offices and computer labs linked to the LAN also have access to the OPAC. Students and faculty members can browse the KOHA OPAC from their mobile devices or computers when connected to the campus-wide Wi-Fi network, which is freely available. In addition, manual registers for entry, exit, issue, and return are also maintained as additional records. In our library, books are classified according to Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) Scheme in which books and other library materials are organized by subject.

UGC-INFLIBNET accounts are provided to both faculty and students, particularly the PG students and research scholars to facilitate academics and research by providing access to scholarly information and resources. Faculty and students are provided with username and password to access the journals and e-books through computer or mobile. The INFLIBNET account is renewed every academic year.

The general library is provided with 5 computers, out of which 4 are made available to students for browsing. The college has a library forum with faculty and librarian as members to discuss about the functioning of library and give required guidance and suggestions. Books needed for different subjects are purchased from Plan fund based on the requirements raised from the respective departments. The college library has a separate reference section with 296 books in various subjects. The college library also has science journals and has subscription for newspapers and weekly magazines. The undergraduate students are permitted to borrow a maximum of four books and PG students, a maximum of six books at a time. On an average the number of teachers and students using the library per day is 24. The library hall is also provided with CCTV surveillance facility to ensure safety and security.

#### 4.3 IT Infrastructure

#### 4.3.1

#### **Response:**

The college consistently upgrades the IT facilities to meet the evolving needs of both students and the staff. Initially the college had an internet connection with a speed of 30 mbps, under the NMEICT scheme. Recently, in the year 2023 (April 2023), a high-speed internet connection (Fiber Silver Plus OTT Plan) with a bandwidth of 300 mbps till 5000GB, up to 30 mbps beyond of BSNL was introduced. Improvement has been made to enhance Wi-Fi connectivity, expand the range of ICT tools available, and grant free internet access to all. The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled through a router and 4 access points in different blocks. The introduction of a 300 Mbps internet connection has notably elevated the standard of academic and administrative activities. The IT infrastructure supports administrative tasks such as finance, accounting, centralized admissions, and examinations especially those coming under the SLCM scheme.

INFLIBNET accounts are provided to both faculty and students, particularly the PG students and research scholars to facilitate academics and research by providing access to scholarly information and resources. Implementation of MOODLE-LMS (Learning Management System) and Google classrooms since pandemic in 2021 was a great step forward for streamlining educational processes which ensured smooth online teaching and learning.

Specific IT amenities directly utilized by students include a Computer Science lab with 60 computers (60 desktop), Geoinformatics lab with 12 computers (10 desktops and 2 laptops), Statistics lab with 36 computers (21 desktops and 15 laptops), Physics lab with 21 computers (one work station, 15 desktops and 5 laptops), Mathematics lab with 10 computers, an incubation centre/skill development centre with 12 computers, a library browsing hub with 4 computers. Apart from these, additional computers and printers are provided for departmental use, office use and for IQAC. LCD projectors are provided in seminar halls and out of 38 classrooms in the college, majority are ICT enabled with either fixed or portable LCDs and two PG classrooms (Physics and Maths) are provided with intelligent interactive panel for teaching.

The college makes use of licensed software's such as MS-office, OS Software's for WINDOWS and LINUX, Software's related to programming languages in curriculum such as C++, C, Python, MATLAB, Plotting and data manipulation softwares like GNU plot, Origin, Matplotlib-Python, note taking app used with writing tablet-Xournal etc. and antivirus softwares. Physics lab is equipped with a Workstation (Dell Precision 3650 Tower) for mass data processing.

In January 2019, Dr. Aneeshkumar Arimbasseri, Scientist, National Institute of Immunology, New Delhi (Alumni-Biochemistry Department) delivered a talk on "Changing Face of Biochemistry". In 2021 Dr. Dhanya Bhaskar, Associate Professor, Ecosystem and Environment Management and Chairperson of Centre for Policy Studies, Indian Institute of Forest Management, Bhopal (Alumni-Biotechnology Department) delivered a talk on "Reimaging Biodiversity Conservation in India: People do matter."

In January 2022, Mr. Anumod S, Examiner Patents & Designs, The Patent Office, Chennai, Government of India (Alumnus-Biochemistry Department) delivered a talk on IPR-Awareness. These events highlight the ongoing engagement of our alumni in sharing their expertise and knowledge with students and faculty. Their contribution not only enriched the academic environment but also inspired our students to pursue excellence in their respective fields.

In 2021 and 2022, the Departments of Geography and Statistics registered their alumni which paved the way for a more structured and organized alumni engagement.

An institutional level alumni association was formed in 2023. The event was chaired by Prof. (Dr.)Sandhia G S, Principal, and attended by faculty members and alumni. The Principal underscored the importance of Alumni Association in academic and financial advancement, emphasizing the need for a registered association with annual audits to foster the institution's growth.

A 15-member Alumni Executive Committee was formed, with the Principal as the President and a faculty member as Treasurer. Addressing alumni representation, the Executive Committee decided to include a Staff Alumni as an Ex-Officio member. It was decided to finalize the bylaws of the association and other initiatives related to registration in the forthcoming meetings.

A WhatsApp group was established, encouraging social interaction among alumni and assisting graduate students with job opportunities, projects, and ventures. These initiatives strengthen the bond between alumni and their alma mater, ensuring continued support and collaboration for years to come.

#### 6.1.1

#### **Response:**

- Vision and Mission: The vision of the college is to elevate the status of the institution to Centre of Excellence in higher education. The college aims to inculcate value-based quality education among students to uphold human ideals and values through various curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular, and extension activities. The institution ensures active participation of the students from all strata of society. Promoting gender equality is one of the integral attributes of the institution that enables women to challenge the discrimination existing in various spheres of society. Male and female students/staff are at par in participating and leading various academic and administrative activities of the college. The college focuses on student-centered learning where faculties act as facilitators by imparting inquisitiveness among students through inquiry-based instruction for developing critical thinking. Faculties are encouraged to adapt the latest teaching strategies to cater to the abilities and learning styles of the students. The teachers are equipped through various training programs to accommodate the rapid changes and increased complexity of the academic arena.
- NEP implementation: As part of preparedness in implementing the Four-Year Undergraduate Program (FYUGP) from the academic year 2024 onwards, IQAC has conducted workshops to create awareness among teaching & non-teaching staff and also encouraged the teachers to participate in FYUGP based workshops and training programmes conducted by the Higher Education Department, Govt. of Kerala. Being part of academic bodies like BoS (Board of Studies) and Academic Council of various universities, our teaching faculty has contributed to the designing of NEP based curriculum.
- Sustained institutional growth: The institution ensures sustainable institutional growth through MoUs with other institutions including nearby school as well as collaborating with participatory village at Pullampara to foster experiential learning among students. The college also maintains a good rapport with alumni who visit the college, take orientation classes for the students in their respective disciplines.
- Decentralized and participative management: The college practices a decentralized and participative management approach through different committees that take care of admission, internal assessment, student grievance redressal, etc. As per government guidelines, mandatory committees and clubs are formed. The College Council, an advisory apex body, makes decisions related to academic, administrative, financial, and disciplinary activities. #### **Response:**

#### **Institutional Perspective Plan**

The strategic plan was framed by the IQAC based on the suggestions of the NAAC Peer team (Cycle-1) and discussions made among the major stakeholders and by the college council from time to time aiming for the multidimensional growth of the institution in alignment with the vision and mission of the college. The IQAC of college functions by focusing on different areas to ensure and enhance the quality of education and overall development of the institution. The five-year strategic plan for development of the college is envisaged based on the criteria set by NAAC for quality enhancement. The strategic plan is crafted to bring improvement in areas such as academic excellence, curricular planning & implementation, student support & progression, teaching learning & evaluation, infrastructure & learning resources, research and development, governance & leadership, engagement of stakeholders, quality assurance & accreditation and best practices to be followed. The plan is deployed through the following.

Policies and Procedures: The college being a government institution, follows government policies laid down by Ministry of Higher Education, Government of Kerala and implemented by the Directorate of Collegiate Education. The institution also follows the guidelines issued by the University of Kerala. The College Council discusses and oversees the implementation of all significant institutional management and operational plans. In keeping with a broader goal and scope, IQAC develops policy following deliberations and meetings among its members. Exclusive rules and procedural guidelines of the college including code of conduct, which are essential to its effective operation, are widely displayed on its website. These guidelines are then put into practice by the committees, departments, clubs, and other support organizations of the institution. The students play a role in decision making and governance as

College Union office bearers and members of student IQAC.

Administrative setup: As the Head of the institution, Principal presides over the major bodies such as the College Council, PTA, and College Union. The College Council is an advisory body for the Academic, Administrative, Financial and Disciplinary activities. IQAC facilitates various academic activities and ensures the maintenance of a learner-centric environment conducive to quality education. It also documents the various activities leading to quality improvement. Various committees, clubs, and cells are functioning effectively under the leadership of the respective coordinators and convenors. Discipline of the college is ensured and maintained by the timely intervention of anti-ragging cell, grievance-redressal cell and discipline committee. Extension activities are carried out efficiently by NCC, NSS, SFS, clubs including nature club and Gandhian studies.

The administrative wing works under the guidance of the Superintendent and Head Accountant.

**Appointments and Service Rules**: The recruitment process for teaching and non-teaching staff is exclusively carried out by the KPSC (Kerala Public Service Commission) thus assuring the quality of staff of the college. The contract faculties are appointed on merit-based interviews. The service matters of the teaching faculties are executed as per the UGC guidelines and KSR (Kerala Service Rules). The service matters of non-teaching staff are administered solely based on KSR.

The institution through the IQAC assesses the performance of each faculty annually. The objective is to evaluate the performance as per established norms that can lead to further progress and growth of the faculty. The performance of each faculty member is evaluated annually based on the Annual Performance Appraisal Report. Promotions are based on the PBAS proforma for the UGC Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) which is checked and verified by the Head of the Departments followed by the IQAC and the Principal. The Promotions are based on the recommendations of the Screening Committee/ Selection Committee. The faculties are assigned various academic and administrative duties and responsibilities as per the decision of the IQAC. The institution accords weightage for these contributions in their overall assessment.

#### **Non-Teaching Staff**

The performance of the Head Accountant and junior/Senior Superintendent is evaluated and a confidential report will be sent to the Directorate of Collegiate Education by the Principal.

It is also mandatory for all the teaching and non-teaching staff to submit an Online Confidential Report every year in SCORE, a software used to file the confidential reports of the government employees of Kerala.

#### **Welfare Measures**

The institution has effective welfare measures for both the teaching as well as the non-teaching staff as per the Kerala Service Rules (KSR). The staff is entitled to casual leave, commuted leave, half-pay leave, maternity leave (6 months), paternity leave (10 days), and duty leave for attending various courses, seminars, workshops, etc. The various insurance schemes, which include GPAIS, SLI, and GIS, where a nominal amount is deducted from the salary, are also provided. They are also eligible for medical reimbursement. Medisep is a scheme that intends to provide comprehensive health insurance coverage to all the serving employees, pensioners, and their dependents in the State Government of Kerala, and it was implemented this year. The staff are also eligible to avail of a loan from the GPF up to 75% to meet certain unforeseen expenses, and the procedures for the same are done online. They also receive an amount as a festival allowance for Onam and are also eligible for Onam Advance.

The female staff has a separate room with all the necessary amenities. The college canteen provides homely meals at a very nominal rate. The college canteen was included in the hunger-free Kerala project by the Government of Kerala. The project aims to provide food at a fair price daily to needy persons. A PTA-run store provides all essential stationery items. Staff Club organizes recreational activities and programs to strengthen the interpersonal relationships among the members.

#### Avenues for career development/progression

The IQAC organizes various training programmes for both teaching and non-teaching. The teaching staff are encouraged to pursue Ph.D as well as Ph.D guideship. All facilities are provided to them in the best possible ways. They are also encouraged to take up various training programmes to enhance their skills and to upgrade their existing academic knowledge.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

#### 6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

# **Response:**

The College, as Government institution, predominantly relies on funding from State Government to meet its financial requirements. Funding covers salaries, lab equipment, library resources, infrastructure purchases, and construction activities. Additionally, the college may receive funds from UGC, State Government, Plan/Non-Plan funds from DCE, CDC matching grants and PTA. Plan fund includes funds for modernization of classrooms, starting of new courses, faculty development, study tours etc. Non-plan funds include medical reimbursement, office expenses, water charges and other expenses.

The institution employs a structured framework to ensure efficient utilization of allocated funds, under the supervision of College Council, Purchase Committee and college administration. College Council monitors effective resource planning and implementation. Purchase Committee, led by Principal and coordinated by convenor, monitors various purchase tenders, procurement processes and allocation of funds for sanctioned projects, ensuring transparent and organized financial management. Annual proposals of Plan/Non-plan funds are submitted to DCE to upgrade infrastructure, lab and library facilities.

During the admission procedure, parents contribute to PTA fund, mobilization of which is duly recorded. PTA executive members selected during PTA general body meetings conducted annually, make decisions regarding utilization of funds for daily maintenance expenses. Any unforeseen expenditure incurred by PTA is later refunded by the concerned authority. Accounts are maintained regularly and utilization of funds is made transparent. Financial allocations are deliberated during regular meetings and are presented at General Body meetings following annual audit.

College Development Committee (CDC), constituted by the government, with the district collector as Chairman, plays a pivotal role in utilization of allocated budget for development of the institution. The DCE sanctions amount collected by CDC and an equal amount as matching grant, as per directions of the Government, based on proposals submitted by Principal. Optimum utilization of the fund for overall development of the college is planned in CDC meeting. Various projects such as study tours, FDPs, seminars, workshops, and Women Cell initiatives are organized with financial assistance from the government.

All financial transactions undergo scrutiny and auditing by external and internal government agencies. The convener of PTA submits expenditure reports detailing income and expenses, which are subsequently reviewed by the Principal. An annual internal audit is conducted and verified by Principal. Physical verification conducted by Stock Verification committees is also included in the internal audit process that includes verification of documents regarding plan/non-plan funds and other miscellaneous transactions. Cash book, CDC register, term fee register, guest lecturer appointment, and PD register also undergo a thorough audit. Periodic external audits are conducted by the Office of Accountant General, Government of Kerala which reviews all financial and non-financial documents, identifying discrepancies, if any, that are addressed through clarifications, providing sufficient documents, or correcting clerical errors. Final accounts are settled by incorporating suggestions and directives for further fund utilization. Annual accounts undergo auditing in accordance with government guidelines, including systematic examination and evaluation of accounts, documents, books and vouchers. ensuring the institution's financial compliance in all financial transactions. The last audit was conducted in 2022, from 2017 to 2020.

# **Response:**

The college has actively promoted gender equity through various programs and initiatives over the years. In 2018-19, the celebration of International Women's Day included the program 'Penpulari,' which focused on women's rights and laws. Additionally, a Self-Defense Training Program was organized to address the increasing incidents of violence against women. In 2019-20, an awareness program on Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) was conducted, emphasizing the importance of personal hygiene for female students.

The following academic year, the celebration of International Women's Day in 2021 highlighted the challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. Themes such as "Women in leadership: Achieving an equal future in a COVID-19 world" and "Choose to challenge" were emphasized. The college organized activities like a video presentation and poster exhibition to promote these themes.

In 2021-22, a Gender Sensitization and Anti-Dowry Campaign was organized in collaboration with the University of Kerala Centre for Women's Studies. The program aimed to introduce ideas of gender sensitization and dowry prohibition to college students. The Women's Day celebrations in the same academic year continued to address challenges exacerbated by the pandemic, focusing on gender equality and breaking biases. Talks by Dr.Seethalekshmi Sunil and Dr.Salom Njana Thanga emphasized breaking stereotypes and empowering women in all aspects of life.

Furthermore, in 2021-22, the college's NSS unit contributed to Women's Day celebrations by collecting lunch packets and distributing them to street vendors, most of whom were women. The college actively participated in initiatives organized by the Women and Child Development Department of the Government of Kerala, collaborating with the Gender Justice Forum for gender sensitization campaigns.

Moving to the academic year 2022-23, a one-day seminar on Menstrual Hygiene was organized by the Women's Cell in collaboration with Jeevani and the Student Union. The seminar aimed to raise awareness about the importance of menstrual hygiene practices and featured Mr.Pradeep Kumar as the resource person. The seminar addressed the need for awareness sessions to ensure proper menstrual hygiene and discussed the social, cultural, and religious barriers that hinder effective menstrual hygiene management.

Additionally, a report on the Gender Sensitization Campaign organized by the Women and Child Development Department in association with the Gender Justice Forum highlighted various webinars focusing on gender and law, gender relations, and the importance of gender equality.

In the initial years, the college placed emphasis on events such as the Gandhi Jayanthi Celebrations in 2018, involving both on-campus and off-campus cleaning activities, as well as participation in cleaning programs at the Central Railway Station. The institution's commitment to combating substance abuse was evident through the Anti-narcotic Initiatives in 2018-19, which included the operation of an Anti-Narcotic club in collaboration with the Kerala police and the organization of awareness programs.

Cultural and blood donation activities played a significant role in fostering a holistic educational environment. The hosting of the French Food Festival, interactions with choreographer Annette Leday, and organizing blood donation camps in collaboration with the Government Medical College reflected the college's commitment to cultural enrichment and community well-being. The socio-economic surveys and flood relief efforts in 2018 showcased the active involvement of NCC units in surveys, awareness programs, and flood relief during the Kerala floods, along with fundraising for Ockhi victims.

The years 2019 witnessed the college's engagement in national and international celebrations, including active participation in Independence Day and International Yoga Day. Observance of World Ozone Day and involvement in the FIT INDIA Movement underscored the institution's dedication to holistic well-being. The 150th Birthday Celebrations of Mahatma Gandhi involved inclusive activities such as campus cleaning, flower gardens setup, quiz competitions, and awareness programs.

In 2020, despite the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, we demonstrated adaptability and resilience. Virtual celebrations marked Constitutional Day Observance, Independence Day, and Republic Day, with students pledging the Indian Constitution's preamble from their homes. Webinars addressing health issues related to the pandemic, fitness programs, and English for Career were organized, showcasing the institution's commitment to maintaining educational continuity during the lockdown. Stress management activities, online meetings, competitions, and webinars further demonstrated the college's responsiveness to the needs of its students.

The subsequent academic year, 2021-22, continued to reflect the institution's commitment to a well-rounded education. National Days Celebrations, an Intellectual Property Rights awareness program, and observations of National Unity Day, National Youth Day, and Naval Day emphasized civic duties through pledge-taking, awareness classes, and quizzes. Active participation in the Clean India Program, a Pollution Control Day Campaign, and the creation of a drug awareness video for a contest organized by Vimukthi mission showcased the college's engagement in societal issues.

In 2022-23, we persisted in its dedication to holistic education. Events marking National Youth Day, National Unity Day, Republic Day Cultural Program, and participation in the National Youth Parliament Festival reflected a continued emphasis on civic responsibilities. Eco-friendly Holi celebrations, Christmas festivities, the French Food Festival, and participation in the Kerala University Youth Festival showcased the institution's commitment to cultural diversity.

Additionally, socio-economic initiatives such as 'Sneha Sammanam,' 'Padheyam,' donations to workers in rain-affected areas, tribal village visits, and a hair donation drive for cancer patients underscored the college's focus on community well-being.

- 1. Title of the Practice: "Healing Hearts: Illuminating Hope for Bedridden Patients"
- 2. Objectives of the Practice

Provide holistic support to bedridden patients, conduct palliative surveys, improve mental and emotional well-being of patients, distribute medicines and food kits, foster a sense of community among patients and make students emotionally mature, empathetic, service minded and capable of facing real life situations.

### 3. The Context

Our college has accessibility to several organisations and residential colonies dwelled by people of lower socioeconomic background. The evolving needs of patients due to the progression of illness require continuous adaptation of support services. The college has Palliative Care Club 'Prathidhi' comprising both staff and students which play a major role in providing the support. NSS Cell, University of Kerala provides a fund for Student Palliative Care activities. The college has a counselling center 'Jeevani' with a psychologist that can provide necessary mental and emotional support to patients and their caregivers. Two of our faculties have attended a 'Volunteer Training Program' conducted by Pallium India. Our college promotes holistic development of students through experiential learning by engaging them in social service. In this context the college has adopted palliative care activity as one of its best practices.

## 4. The Practice

With the assistance of the Medical College Health Center (PHC), Pangappara, students conduct socio-economic-health surveys in the neighbouring communities. Bedridden and terminally ill patients who require palliative care are identified and shortlisted under the guidance of palliative nurses of the PHC. Students thereafter visit their home along with 'Jeevani' psychologist and hospital authorities to provide necessary palliative care including supply of medicines, medical equipment and other supplies. The palliative care survey and activity of 'Prathidhi' was also extended to Vlavila Tribal Settlement, Kottur. Students and staff have also generated funds for palliative care activities. The initiative also recognizes the emotional challenges faced by patients with the help of Jeevani counsellor.

### 5. Evidence of Success

Performance indicators include successful identification of patients in the Kazhakoottam Ward and Kottur village; delivery of essential items such as medicines & medical equipment, food kits, diapers, bedsheets and providing psychological support. The engagement with patients, both in St. Theresa's Old age home, CH Mohammed Koya Mental Rehabilitation Center, Sadana Renewal Center (Psychosocial Rehabilitation Centre) Monvila, Different Art Centre (DAC), KINFRA Park, Thiruvananthapuram and residential colonies dwelled by people of lower socio-economic background and individual households, demonstrates the initiative's effectiveness in reaching its target demographic.

The collaborative efforts with 'Jeevani' for psychological support signify a comprehensive approach in addressing the emotional needs of bedridden patients and caregivers. The results indicate not only the program's efficacy in addressing the targeted needs but also sensitizing the students about the requirements of the needy.

6. Problems encountered, and resources required: Maintaining patient Privacy, managing caregiver stress, time constraints of staff and students. Fund and human resources are required.

#### **Best Practice 2**

### 1. Title of the Practice

"Empowering Villages through Institutional Linkage-Nattu Velicham"

# 2. Objectives of the Practice

The program aims to uplift the participatory village by advancing general awareness among the village community through multifaceted approach which including community Empowerment, skill development, community development, mutual Learning, Promotion of Sustainable Practices, personal growth & reflection and long-term engagement.

3. The Context: College has access to Thelikkachal village of Pullampara Panchayath, Vamanapuram, through a faculty of the college. The college has ample human resources and experts in various disciplines, who can extend their proficiency that can be beneficial for the village in various aspects.

#### 4. The Practice

The initiative commenced with a pilot visit and socio-economic survey aimed at assessing local facilities, understanding the educational landscape, and engaging with the community to tailor the program to its specific needs. Fundraising was done from among the faculty members to initiate these activities. In view of the objectives, following programs were organised at the Thellickachal village.

- ? Youth for Rivers at the banks of Vamanapuram River of Thelikkachal Village.
- ? Kalarivanam: Setting up of a mini forest and butterfly park at the banks of the Vamanapuram river.
- ? Riverbank mapping by students of Geography and Zoology department.
- ? Nature walks along the village to experience and familiarise themselves with the native life and nature.
- ? Health camps and campaigns
- ? Eco-friendly gallery: College has participated in setting up an eco-friendly gallery for small  $\,$

gatherings and awareness classes in a nature friendly environment.

- ? Setting up of library: Students and faculty contributed books for upgrading the library.
- ? NEP based awareness class for higher secondary school students of the villages and their parents
- 5. Evidence of Success

The performance of the program has been gauged through several key indicators.

Providing training and resources to community members enhanced their skills and knowledge in respective areas. Environment related activities created awareness and sensitized both students and the village community about the significance of protecting the environment. Health related campaigns offered an understanding of their individual health status. Introducing the use of eco-friendly menstrual

cups was welcomed by the women community of the village. The level of involvement and enthusiasm from community members was commendable. The wholehearted participation and cooperation from the community in these activities served as a catalyst in building a positive partnership which encouraged the students for active engagement. This suggests that the initiative effectively reached the intended beneficiaries. The participation rate in the NEP based free training session for school students and parents exceeded expectations, with a significant turnout from the target demographic and successfully addressed the knowledge gap between secondary and higher education. The clarity provided during these orientations has contributed to an informed decision-making among students regarding their educational paths.

Through participatory village activity our students were also benefited as they learned to handle leadership roles, manage events and improve proficiency in applying theoretical knowledge in real life situations.

The palliative care survey and activity of 'Prathidhi' was also extended to Vlavila Tribal Settlement, Kottur. Students and staff have also generated funds and contributed to all these palliative care activities. Beyond medical support, the initiative recognizes the emotional challenges faced by patients. The Jeevani counselor interacts with the patients and bystanders to provide emotional and psychological support.

The institution's performance in this area is distinctive due to its community-centric approach, which aligns with the social responsibilities of educational institutions. It exemplifies the potential for higher education to extend beyond traditional roles, actively contributing to societal well-being. By prioritizing the welfare of bedridden patients, Government College Kariavattom showcases a commitment to creating socially responsible and empathetic citizens through its educational initiatives.
